Report of June 2, 2001 Election By Carla S. Cawlfield, Election Committee Chairman

GENERAL INFORMATION:

THIS WAS THE FIRST COMPUTER-BASED ELECTION AT HAL-PC AND IT WORKED MAGNIFICENTLY!!! This system will be used on all future elections.

- 1. Results-posted in Attachment A. Out of approximately 13,000 HAL-PC members, 347 voted, or 2.67%.
- 2. Committee Thank You-The Election Committee wishes to thank everyone who helped us at HAL-PC. The following people served on the Election Committee and deserve thanks:
- Carla S. Cawlfield, Marilyn Gore, Robert Gunn, Jeff Hupp, Wes Leggett, Joe Morris, Jr. Also working the night of the Election were Joanne Ballato and Stephen Cravey.
- 3. Man-hours worked-Since January 23, 2001, the EC worked about 40 hours. Last year, because it was a completely manual process, in just the last three weeks, the Election Committee worked almost 200 hours. This is by far the easiest election ever held at HAL-PC. We announced the results at 7:03pm.

AREAS FOR IMPROVEMENT: NONE! (Just a little "tweaking".) (The black type is a reprint from the June 6, 2000 Report.) The Blue type is from 2001.

Year 2000-All aspects of the historical HAL-PC election process should be reviewed. With under 5% of our members voting, the Board of Directors should invent election policies that are much more member-friendly. Addressed by the 2001 Election Committee and DONE! There are only a limited number of things the Election Committee can do to increase voter turnout. We addressed that which is in our authority.

- 4. Electronic Voting (both Internet and Election Night)-The Board of Directors of HAL-PC needs to explore the logistics, mechanics, legalities, and security issues relating to Electronic Voting. Electronic Voting could be as broad as allowing the members to vote via the Internet, or as narrow as having computers set up for voting the night of the Special Meeting. This would certainly be easier for a larger number of the HAL-PC members to vote, and it might even be easier on the Election Committee. It is ironic that the world's largest computer club does not use computers in its elections. Addressed by the 2001 Election Committee and DONE! We had both at home online voting available from May 1 thru June 2, 2001, as well as voter computer entry voting at HAL-PC HQ the night of the Election. This computer system will be used in all future HAL-PC elections, with a little bit of tweaking.
- 5. Membership Database-This year's Election Committee used May 1, 2000, as the cutoff date for the official certified membership database. This meant that anyone who was not on that list was not eligible to vote. During the Absentee cycle, out of 512 requests, 23 (4.49%) were rejected due to expired memberships. At the General Meeting, at least 10 people (out of about 400) were denied ballots due to expired memberships. Some of these 10 people had

current blue membership cards with either 05/2001 or 06/2001 expiration dates. They were perhaps slightly late in their renewals, but thought of themselves as current HAL-PC members. Neither the Election Committee nor these members were happy about there being no way to accommodate their voting wishes, and many of these members felt they were unfairly disenfranchised. We need to think up a better way, if possible. Addressed by the 2001 Election Committee and DONE! We ran notices for two months in the HAL-PC Magazine advising voters to get their memberships current before the April 14, 2001 deadline. No voters were turned away unhappy on election night due to expired memberships.

6. Absentee Ballots-Scrap the need for members to personally write to the Election Committee requesting an Absentee Ballot. This process is Byzantine, quirky, expensive, unwieldy and unfriendly to both the members and the Election Committee. The process used this year required several steps-1. The member had to mail in an Absentee Ballot request by a certain date (May 15), and include a self-addressed, stamped envelope. 2. The EC had to check this request against the database, issue a ballot, and mail it back to the member. 3. The member had to return the Ballot to the EC by another certain date (May 29). 4. The EC had to then look up the member again in the database, and log that member as having voted. Addressed by the 2001 Election Committee and DONE! We printed the Ballot in the HAL-PC Magazine with a Validation Section, posted it on our website, and made copies available in the HAL-PC HQ all during the month of May. An official governmental sealed Ballot Can was provided for collection of the Ballots. All verification of membership was done at the time the vote was tallied. This was a much simpler process.

A simpler, still secure method is the following:

- * Post a PDF copy of the Absentee Ballot with a Validation Section on the HAL-PC website for members to download, AND print a copy of the Absentee Ballot with a Validation Section in the Magazine, for members to cut out, or photocopy, and mail in to a PO Box. This covers both classes of members-those with Internet access, and those whose only link to HAL-PC is the Magazine. Addressed by the 2001 Election Committee and DONE! Due to lack of use, the P O Box will not be used in the future.
- * The Validation Section will carry the Member's Name, HAL-PC Membership Number, and Signature. Upon receipt of the Ballot, the Election Committee will compare the information to the membership database, and if no other Ballot has already been received for that member, it will be counted. In the event of a duplication or discrepancy, the member listed in the membership database can be contacted to confirm which is the accurate ballot. This cuts down by 2/3 the amount of work required of the Election Committee, and reduces the cost and number of steps required for the member to negotiate. Addressed by the 2001 Election Committee and DONE!

HAL-PC Treasurers Report May 2001

At the time of this writing, May 3rd, HAL-PC has no significant outstanding debt and a balance of \$201,093.52 in the Bank of America cash account. Michelle informs me that there are outstanding items amounting to approximately \$55,000 against this balance and deposits to be made totalling \$12,000. There have been no transfers to or from any of HAL's other accounts during this period.

This month we met with Jody Blazek of Blazek & Vetterling to discuss what is required in order to keep HAL-PC on the right track. She is a specialist in the area of non-profit accounting and by far the most knowledgeable individual in this area that I have ever encountered.

We are nearing the end of HAL-PC's financial year which means it is time again to work on our budget. In order to provide the necessary time to develop the next years' budget we will need to pass a motion to extend spending authority at the present levels to pay any bills that come due.

I move that we authorize spending at the levels of the present years' spending until the end of the August Board Meeting or until a new budget is approved, whichever comes first.

Vice-President/Communications Report to the HAL-PC Board of Directors June 7th, 2001

Internet

This year saw the introduction of on-line web-based voting for the HAL-PC Board of Directors, an innovation which has been discussed for many years as a logical one for a computer club to employ.

In the interest of making the HALNet service more attractive to potential users and in an effort to distinguish ourselves in the marketplace, a significant upgrade to HALNet s news server was recently completed. Improvement has been noted in terms of completeness of newsgroup contents as well as speed of article delivery to our users.

While our total user count has remained at a plateau of approximately 7900 users, we do continue to add ADSL users as the service becomes available to more and more areas.

In the commercial area, HALNet has recently begun providing a fractional T1 internet feed, at market rates, to a new customer. In time, it is hoped that revenue growth from our commercial service offerings will significantly offset our present recurring monthly costs for Internet bandwidth and connectivity.

The Magazine

Over the last year, The Magazine has experienced a number of significant changes. The Magazine is now produced entirely on a computer and digitally transferred to the printer, Western Lithograph, resulting in reduced production costs as well as more timely delivery to our members. A number of new columns have appeared providing a broader range of article subjects and viewpoints. Paid advertising in The Magazine has also seen significant growth in the last year due in part to the HAL-PC National Ad Program undertaken by Duhrmon Jennings, HAL-PC s full-time advertising salesman. As always, The Magazine is anxious for input from our members.
